## Key Functions

1. Earpiece: Allows you to hear the other caller and the different ring tones and sounds offered by your phone.
2. Signal Strength Indicator: Displays the current signal strength.
3. Main LCD (Display): Displays all of the information needed to operate your phone.
4. Navigation Key: Allows you to scroll through the phone menu options and provides a shortcut to phone functions from standby mode.
5. Softkey (Left): Can be used in several different ways.

- In standby mode, press to access the Menu.
- When using other features, such as the Web Browser, the Left softkey performs a context-sensitive action. This action is shown in the bottom left corner of the Main LCD.

6. MENU/OK: Can be used in several different ways.

- In standby mode, press to access the Menu.
- Press when navigating through a menu to accept the highlighted choice in the menu.

7. Talk Key: Can be used in several different ways.

- Allows you to place or receive a call.
- In standby mode, press the key once to access the Recent Calls log.
- If you press and hold the key down, you will initiate the Voice Recognition feature.

8. Back Key: Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. When in a menu, press to return to the previous menu.
9. Keypad: Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters.
10. Microphone: Allows the other caller to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
11. END/POWER Key: Used in several different ways.

- During a call, press to end the call.
- When you receive an incoming call, press to enter silent mode and mute the ringer.
- When the phone is off or in standby mode, press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone On or Off.
- When in the main menu, press to return the phone to standby mode and cancel your input.

12. Softkey (Right): Can be used in several different ways.

- In standby mode, press to access your Contacts.
- In text entry mode, press to change the character input type.
- When using other features, such as the Web Browser, the Right softkey performs a context-sensitive action. This action is shown in the bottom right corner of the Main LCD.

13. Battery Strength Indicator: Displays the current battery strength.
14. Camera Lens: Allows you to take pictures.
15. Volume Button: Can be used in several different ways.

- Adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (with the flip open) or to adjust the voice volume during a call.
- Scroll up or down to navigate through the different menu options.
- To mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume key up or down.

16. Sub LCD: Allows you to see caller information and the phone's status without opening the phone.
17. Charger/Accessories Jack: Used to connect any available accessory cables to your phone.
18. Headset Jack: Allows the other caller to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
19. Side Camera Button: Used to launch the integrated digital camera, when the phone is open or closed.

## Viewing the Display Screens

Your phone's Main and Sub LCD display screens provide a wealth of information about your phone's status and options. This list identifies the symbols you'll see on your phone's display screens:

Indicates that your phone is receiving 3G service.
Indicates that your phone is receiving digital service.

Indicates that your web connection is active and data is being transferred. Incoming voice calls go directly to voicemail. Outgoing voice calls can be made, but the web connection will terminate. Indicates that your web connection is not active.

Indicates that position location is active.

Indicates that position location is inactive.

Indicates that your phone is in web security mode.

Indicates that your phone is roaming.

Indicates that you have Voicemail, text, picture messages or video messages waiting.

- Press and hold to dial your Voicemail box.

Indicates that there is an Urgent Message in your inbox.

Indicates that the message is locked. A locked message is not deleted when Erase All or Auto Delete are used.

Indicates that your phone is in vibrate mode.
Indicates that the TTY option is On.
Indicates that your phone is set to high ringer plus vibrate mode.

Indicates that the ringer is set at a level between 1-8 or that 1-Beep is selected.

Indicates Ringer Off + Vibrate mode; the ringer is off and vibrate is on.

Indicates Silence All mode; all sound is turned off when ringer is off.

Indicates Mute mode; the microphone turned off.

Indicates that an alarm is set on your phone.

Tells you a call is in progress.

Means there is no service, as your phone cannot find a signal.

Displays your current signal strength. When you are receiving maximum signal strength, six bars are shown.


Displays your current battery strength at full.

Displays your current battery strength at empty.

Indicates that the self-timer function is enabled. With the self timer enabled, a set amount of time is required prior to taking a picture.

Indicates that the Brightness meter is enabled.

Indicates that the white balance has been set to Automatic.

Indicates that the white balance has been set to Sunny. This is used for taking pictures outdoors on bright sunny days.
Indicates that the white balance has been set to Cloudy. This is used for taking pictures outdoors under cloudy conditions.
Indicates that the white balance has been set to Tungsten. This is used for taking pictures indoors under normal lighting conditions.
Indicates that the white balance has been set to Fluorescent. This is used for taking pictures indoors under fluorescent lighting conditions.

Indicates that the white balance has been set to Manual. This is used for taking pictures indoors or outdoors using your own custom settings.

Indicates that a picture is being assigned.

Indicates that a picture is saved to the phone.

Indicates that a picture is being uploaded.

Indicates that a picture is being downloaded.

Indicates that Bluetooth technology is connected.

Indicates that Bluetooth technology is hidden.

Indicates that Bluetooth technology is enabled.

## Turning Your Phone On and Off

## To turn your phone on:

- Press Eno to turn your phone on.

Once your phone is on, it displays "Looking for Service", which indicates that your phone is searching for a signal. When your phone finds a signal, it automatically enters standby mode - the phone's standby mode. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.
If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, the Power Save mode is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.
In Power Save mode, your phone periodically searches for a signal without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned on).

Tip: The Power Save mode helps to conserve battery power when you are in an area without a signal.

## To turn your phone off:

- Press and hold for two seconds until you see the powering down animation on the display screen.
Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).


## Using Your Phone's Battery and Charger

## Battery Capacity

Your phone is equipped with a Lithium Ion (Lilon) battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained.
When the battery reaches a low capacity, the battery icon will blink, followed eventually by an audible alert and then power off.

Note: Long backlight settings, searching for service, vibrate mode, playing games, or using the web affect the battery's talk and standby times.

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Tip: Be sure to watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

## Installing or Removing the Battery

## To install or remove the Lilon battery:

1. Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.
2. To remove the cover plate, push on the thumb tab (1) and slide the cover plate away from the handset (2).


- To remove the battery, pull the top of the battery away from the phone (1) and disconnect it (2).

- To insert the battery, insert the battery into the opening on the back of the phone at an angle (3), making sure the metal contacts on the battery connect with the matching connectors in the phone. Press down until the battery snaps into place (4).


3. To replace the cover plate, slide it toward the handset (1) and push on the thumb tab (2).


## Charging the Battery

Your phone's Lilon battery is rechargeable and should be charged as soon as possible so you can begin using your phone.
Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off and you lose all of the information you were working on. For a quick check of your phone's battery level, glance at the battery charge indicator located in the upper-right corner of either of your phone's display screens. indicates that the battery is full. If the battery charge is getting too low, the battery icon $\square$ blinks and the phone sounds a warning tone. A "Low Battery Recharge Soon" message appears on the phone's display screen.
Always use a Samsung-approved desktop charger, travel adapter, or vehicle power adapter to charge your battery.

[^0]It takes approximately 4 hours to fully recharge a completely drained standard battery. With the Samsung approved Lilon battery, you can recharge the battery before it drains completely.
An animated battery icon is displayed on both the Main LCD screen and the Sub LCD screen. The icon indicates whether the battery is being charged or is fully charged.


## Phone Basics

Note: Your phone can display the various features and options in one of two different menu styles, 3x3 Black and List style. By default, your phone is set to the $3 \times 3$ Black style and this user guide corresponds to the $3 \times 3$ Black style. The List style uses a different numbering scheme for the top-level menus. For more information, see "Menu Styles" on page 25.

## Displaying Your Phone Number

If you forget your phone number, your phone can remind you.

## To display your phone number:

Note: To access the phone's main Menu, press the left softkey from standby mode. Menu items may be selected by highlighting them with the navigation key and pressing "ow . You can also press the number corresponding to the menu item on your keypad.


## Making and Answering Calls

## Making Calls

Placing a call from your phone is as easy as making a call from any land-line phone. Just enter the number and press mand you're on your way to clear calls.

## To make a call using your keypad:

1. Make sure your phone is on.
2. Enter a phone number. (If you make a mistake while dialing, press BACK to erase one digit at a time. Press and hold BACK to erase the entire number.)

Tip: Based on the number entered, the phone will display the province or state underneath the number dialed. This feature works for numbers in Canada and the U.S.A. only. This can help you determine whether you are making a long distance
call. Toll free numbers are not location specific and no province or state name will be displayed.

> 3. Press to call.
> 4. Press or close the phone when you are finished.

Tip: To redial your last recent call, press twice.

You can also place calls from your phone using Voice Dial (page 33), Speed Dialing numbers from your Contacts (page 18), or using your Call History listings (page 66).

## Answering Calls

## To answer an incoming call:

1. Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.)
2. Press trank to answer an incoming call. (Depending on your phone's settings, you can also answer incoming calls by opening the phone or by pressing any number key. See "Call Answer" on page 84 for more information.)
Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings or vibrates (unless set to Silence All).
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.
- The LED illuminates.

If the incoming call is from a number stored in your Contacts, the Contacts entry's name is displayed. The caller's phone number may also be displayed, if available.
The following options are also available to handle an incoming call:

- Press ar the volume key to quiet the ringer.
- Press the volume key to send the incoming call to your voicemail box.

Note: When your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.

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## Ending a Call

## To disconnect a call when you are finished:

- Close the phone or press Eno.


## Missed Call Notification

When an incoming call is not answered, a Missed Call message is displayed on your screen.

- To dial a missed call press



## Calling Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 911 (dial 1 回 and press raik), even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted.


#### Abstract

Warning: After initiating a 911 call, you must end the call by pressing *smen $\#$. This notifies the phone that the 911 call was terminated intentionally by the user. No other calls can be made before terminating the 911 call.

## In-Call Options

Select actions by pressing the right softkey $\cdots$ for $\mathbf{O p t i o n s}$ during a call. A list of options is displayed that allows you to perform different actions during the course of a call. The following options are available: (To select an option, press the corresponding keypad number or highlight the option and press wow .)

- (1) Key Mute or Key UnMute: Allows you to mute or reactivate your phone's key tones.
- (2) Turn Speaker On/Off: Allows you to activate/deactivate the speaker so that other people can listen to the conversation.
- (3) Set Whisper/Cancel Whisper: Increases the volume of the transmitted audio allowing the other person to hear you, even if you are whispering.
- (4) Call History: Checks your call log for Missed, Outgoing, and Incoming calls. You can also erase the logs from this menu.
- (5) Contacts: Accesses the Contacts menu options.
- (6) 3-Way Call: Allows you to talk to two different people at the same time. (For more information, see "Making a Three-Way Call" on page 22.)
- (7) Messaging: Allows you to use the messaging menu and to send text messages.
- (8) Voice Memo: Allows you to record the current conversation. (For more information, see "Reviewing and Erasing Memos" on page 37.)
- (9) Tools: Accesses the Tools menu options.
- (10) Phone Info: Displays the phone number, icon glossary, hardware/ software version, Preferred Roaming List (PRL), system and technology being used.


## End-of-Call Options

After receiving a call from or making a call to a phone number that is not in your Contacts, the phone number and duration of the call are displayed. Press the right softkey for Next followed by $\boldsymbol{B}^{\text {oes }}$ to Save the new number in your Contacts. (See "Saving a Phone Number" below for more information.)

## Saving a Phone Number

Your phone can store up to 500 phone numbers. Contacts entries can store up to a total of five phone numbers, and each entry's name can contain up to 20 characters. (For more information, see "Adding a New Contact" on page 94.)

## To save a number from standby mode:

1. Enter a phone number and press
2. Highlight New Entry and press ow . If your Contacts list is empty, skip this step and proceed to step 3.
3. Select the Type using the navigation key and press \%
4. Enter the Name using the keypad and press "ow.
5. Press the left softkey $\cdots$ for Done.

After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.

## To find a phone number:

1. Enter one to four digits of the last four digits of a phone number, press the right softkey $\cdots$ for $\mathbf{O p t i o n s}$, and select Find. (A list of possible

matches is displayed.)
2. Use your navigation key to display the desired entry.
3. To dial the number, highlight it and press the left softkey $\cdots$ for Call.

## Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or credit card billing numbers.
There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- Hard Pause sends the next set of numbers when you press nux.
- 2-Second Pause automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.

Note: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine 2-second and hard pauses.

## To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

1. Enter a phone number from standby mode.
2. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options and select Hard pause or 2sec Pause. Hard pauses are displayed as a "P" and 2-second pauses as a "T".
3. Enter additional numbers.
4. Press ruax to dial the number.

- or-

Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for $\mathbf{O p t i o n s}$ and select Save to save the number in your Contacts.
When dialing a number with a hard pause, press to send the next set of numbers.

## Abbreviated Dialing

Abbreviated dialing allows you to set a five or six-digit prefix for commonly used phone numbers. When abbreviated dialing is On, you can enter the last four or five digits of any phone number that only matches the five or six digit prefix. The number is dialed using the prefix numbers plus the last four or five digits entered.

## To set up abbreviated dialing:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{7 e r e s g}^{\text {for }}$ Settings.
3. Press 4 em for Call Setup.
4. Press for Abbrev. Dial.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select On and press ${ }^{60}$.
6. Input the five or six digit prefix and press to Save.

## Making an Abbreviated Dial Call

## To make a call:

1. Enter the last four or five digits of the prefix phone number.
2. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options, followed by 1 ■ for Abbrev. Dial.

## Dialing From Contacts

## To dial directly from a Contacts entry:

1. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Contacts.
2. Enter the first few letters of the entry's name to locate the desired entry. -Or-
Scroll down to highlight the desired entry.
3. Press to make the call.

Tip: If the desired entry contains more than one phone number, scroll left or right to display the number you wish to call and press to make the call.

## Using One-Touch or Two-Touch Speed Dialing

You can store up to 98 numbers in your phone's speed dial memory to make contacting friends and family as easy as pressing a few buttons. With this feature, you can dial Speed Dial entries using one key press for locations 2-9, and two key presses for locations 10-99.

## To use One-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 2-9:

- Press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Speed Dial \# ...".)

Note: Location 1 is reserved for voice mail and cannot be changed.

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## To use Two-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 10-99:

1. Press the first digit.
2. Press and hold the second digit for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Speed Dial \# ...".)

## Entering Text

Selecting a Character Input Mode
Your phone provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, symbols, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when adding a Contacts entry or when sending text messages).

## To change the character input mode:

1. When you display a screen where you can enter text, press the right softkey … for Options.
2. Select a character input mode:

- T9 (English) to enter characters using predictive T9 Text Input (see page 19).
- Alpha to enter characters by tapping the keypad (see page 20).
- Symbol to enter symbols (see page 21).
- Number to enter numbers (see page 21).


## Entering Characters Using T9 Text Input

T9 Text Input lets you enter text in your phone by pressing keys once per letter. (To select the ©iNard mode when entering text, see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 19.)

T9 Text Input analyzes the letters you enter using an intuitive word database and creates a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.) If the word you want does not display after you have entered all the letters, press $\mathbf{0}^{* *+1}$ to scroll through additional word selections. To accept a word and insert a space, press \#ser.
If you make a mistake, press BACK to erase a single character. Press and hold
BACK to delete an entire entry.

## To enter text using T9 Text Input:

1. From the text entry screen (for example, a new event in scheduler), press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options and select T9 (English).
2. Use your keypad to enter the new event. (For example, to enter
 once, and 4 em once.)

## Entering Characters Using Alpha mode

To enter characters by tapping the keypad, select the Alpha mode (see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 19). Press the corresponding key repeatedly until the desired character appears. When the Abc icon is shown, the first letter of the first word is capitalized and the following letters are lowercase. The * smen key can be used to select the required case.

## To enter text using Alpha:

1. From a text entry screen (for example, when composing a text message), press the right softkey ... for Options and select Alpha.
2. Use your keypad to enter the contact's name. (For example, to enter "Bill", press man twice, 4 em three times, 5 mm three times, and then after a brief pause 5 mm three times again.)

After a character is entered, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

Note: The complete character set is provided to show which key is to be used to enter the characters. The French and special characters are only available when the phone is in French mode. If you need to compose a text message that contains the

French characters, please refer to "Language" on page 77 and change the phone to French mode.

## Entering Numbers and Symbols

## To enter numbers:

- Select the Number mode and press the appropriate key. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 19.)


## To enter symbols:

- Select the Symbol mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 19.) To enter a symbol, press the appropriate key indicated on the display. Use the navigation key to scroll up or down to see additional symbols.


## Using Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. For information on configuring and retrieving your voice mail, see "Voicemail" on page 42.

## Using Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, just follow these easy steps.
To block your phone number from being displayed for a specific outgoing call:

2. Enter the number you want to call.
3. Press тай

To permanently block your number, call the Customer Service department of your network service provider.

Note: If you have not subscribed to Caller ID, and the backlight is set to turn off after a period of time, pressing taik will switch the backlight back on. Either press and hold or press twice to answer the second call when the LCD is turned off. To avoid this problem, set the backlight to "flip open". For more information, see "Changing the Backlight Time Length" on page 75.

## Responding to Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding two beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available and you are in digital mode).

## To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

- Press rauk. (This puts the first caller on hold and answers the second call.)


## To switch back to the first caller:

## - Press mak again. <br> Making a Three-Way Call

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

## To make a Three-Way Call:

1. Enter a number you wish to call and press Tauk.
2. Once you have established the connection, press the right softkey for Options, followed by $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\text {muo }}$ for 3-Way Call.
3. Dial the second number and press tran.
4. When you're connected to the second party, press again to begin your three-way call.
If one of the people you called hangs up during the call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected.

Tip: You can also begin a Three-Way Call by displaying a phone number stored in your Contacts, Call History, or Messaging. To call the third party, press

Note: Call Waiting and Three-Way Calling are not available while roaming off the network.

## TTY Use With Handset

A TTY (also known as a TDD or Text Telephone), is a telecommunications device that allows people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or have speech or language disabilities to communicate by telephone.
Your phone is compatible with select TTY devices. Please check with the manufacturer of your TTY device to ensure that it supports digital wireless transmission. Your phone and TTY device will connect via a special cable that plugs into your phone's headset jack. If this cable was not provided with your TTY device, contact your TTY device manufacturer to purchase the connector cable.

## To turn TTY Mode on or off:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{7 m o r e s}^{\text {for Settings. }}$

3. Press 1 - for Accessibility.
4. Press for TTY. (A brief explanation of TTY will display.)
5. Press again to continue.
6. Press the navigation key up or down to select TTY OFF or TTY On and press "ow to save and exit.

Note: In TTY Mode when your headset is plugged in, your phone will display the TTY access icon. If TTY mode is enabled, the headset cannot be used.

IMPORTANT 911 Emergency Calling: We recommend that TTY users make emergency calls by other means, including Telecommunications Relay Services (TRS), analog cellular, and land line communications. Wireless TTY calls to 911 may be corrupted when received by public safety answering points (PSAPs) rendering some communications unintelligible. The problem encountered appears related to TTY equipment or software used by PSAPs. This matter has been brought to the attention of the FCC, and the wireless industry and PSAP community are currently working to resolve it.

## Understanding Roaming

## Recognizing Icons on the Display Screen

Your phone's display screen always lets you know when you're off the network. The following chart indicates what you'll see depending on where you're using your phone.

## Roaming on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on your home network. However, you might not be able to access certain features, such as web services.

## Setting Your Phone's System

Your phone allows you to control your ability to roam. Using the Roaming menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts.

## Choose from three different settings on your phone to control your roaming experience:

1. Press ${ }^{\circ} \mathrm{x}$ for Menu.
2. Press $\boldsymbol{Z}_{\text {mose }}$ for Settings.
3. Press $\mathbf{7 r o r e s}^{\text {for More. }}$
4. Press $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\text {muo }}$ for Roaming.
5. Press 1 - for Set Mode.
6. To select an option, highlight it and press $\quad$ "

- Automatic: This setting seeks service. When service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.
- Home Only: This setting allows you to access the home network only preventing roaming on other networks.

## Menu Styles

Your phone can display the various features and options in one of two different menu styles:

## 3x3 Black style

$3 \times 3$ Black displays the first level menu choices with static graphical icons arranged in a grid pattern. As you navigate through the menu, menu options are highlighted. You can use the navigation key to scroll through menus quickly and easily.

- To navigate through a first level menu, simply press the navigation key in the direction of your desired menu choice. The menu choice is highlighted and a text label is displayed. Once the desired menu option is highlighted, press
- You can also press the number corresponding to the menu choice. For example, if you want to view your last incoming call:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{5 m}$ for Call History.
3. Press 1 for Recent History.

## List Style

List style displays all of the menu choices in a vertical list. In other menu levels, choices are also arranged in a vertical list.

- To navigate through a menu, simply press the navigation key up or down. If you are in a first-level menu, such as Settings, you can also navigate to the next menu by pressing the navigation key left or right.
- You can also press the number corresponding to the menu choice. For example, if you want to view your last incoming call:

## Voice Kit

## Voice Service

Voice recognition allows you to say commands to perform common functions supported by your phone. There is no voice training required to use the voice recognition feature. You simply say the pre-designated command displayed on your screen in a normal tone of voice to perform the desired function.

## To activate voice recognition:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{1}$ ㅇor Voice Kit.
3. Press $\mathbf{1}$ - for Voice Service.

Tip: You can also activate Voice Service from standby mode by pressing and holding the rack key.
4. Wait for the beep and then say one of the following commands:

| $\bullet$ Voice Dial | $\bullet$ Voice Mail |
| :--- | :--- |
| $\bullet$ Contacts | $\bullet$ Voice Memo |

When it recognizes one of these commands, the phone launches the associated application. If the phone does not hear a command within approximately eight seconds, it de-activates voice recognition without taking any action.

Note: If you want to use another button to activate voice recognition press "ow for Menu, followed by $\mathbf{7 m o n g}^{\boldsymbol{5} \times \mathrm{m}}$ for Launch Pad. Through this menu, you can change button assignments, including the button used to launch "Voice Service", which is the voice recognition application.

## Using Voice Dial

Voice Dial allows you to dial any valid 7, 10, or 11 digit North American phone number by speaking the number naturally, without pausing between the digits. It also allows you to dial by pronouncing a name stored in your Contacts.

## Tips for using Voice Dial:

- Voice Dial works best in quieter environments.
- When saying a number, speak at a normal speed and say each digit clearly. There is no need to pause between digits.
- The phone recognizes the digits one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, zero, and oh. The phone does not recognize numbers such as "one eight hundred" for "1-800." Instead, say "one-eight-zero-zero."
- The phone recognizes only valid 7,10 , or 11 digit North American phone numbers.


## To place a call using Voice Dial:

1. Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding taik . (The phone prompts you for a command.)
2. Say Voice Dial. (The phone prompts you to say the number or Contact name.)
3. Say either a name stored in your Contacts or a valid 7, 10, or 11 digit North American phone number naturally and clearly.
4. If the phone asks you, "Did You Say", followed by the correct number, say Yes. (You can also select the correct number from those displayed on the screen by pressing on the correct number. The phone will then dial the number.)
5. If the phone asks you, "Did You Say", followed by an incorrect number, say No. (If there are other alternatives, the phone will prompt you with the next one. You can also press the navigation key up or down to select the correct number from the Choice List, and then press to dial.)
6. Alternatively, you can call a person in your Contacts by saying their full name exactly as it is entered in your Contacts. (The phone plays the name through the earpiece and displays it on the screen.)

- If you said a name listed in your Contacts that has more than one number associated with it, the phone displays the different locations (Home, Work, Mobile, Pager, and Others) and asks you which one to dial. Say one of the location names and the phone will dial the number for the specified location.

Note: In some cases, the phone might ask you to repeat a name or number. Make sure that the number is a valid 7,10 , or 11 digit North American phone number, and then say the number again. If the number isn't valid, or if the phone still doesn't understand the number on the second try, it will not place a call.

## Using Name Lookup

Name Lookup lets you retrieve contact information for any person in your Contacts by saying the full name of the person.

## To retrieve information using Name Lookup:

1. Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding $\square$ (The phone will prompt you for a command.)
2. Say Contacts. (The phone will prompt you to say the name.)
3. Press 1 - for Find.
4. In Contacts type the name of the contact or press the navigation key up or down to highlight the name.
5. Press to see the contact information.

## Enabling/Disabling Choice Lists

You can customize whether the Voice Dial feature displays the list of top voice recognition choices or automatically dials the first number, without displaying a choice list.

## To enable or disable choice lists for Voice Dial:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{7 e o s e r}^{\text {for }}$ Settings.
3. Press $\mathbf{7 e n e r g}^{\text {for More. }}$
4. Press 1 - for Accessibility.
5. Press Enex for Voice Service.
6. Press 1 - for Choice Lists.
7. Press the navigation key up or down to select Automatic, Always On or Always Off and press "ow.

## Changing Voice Dial Prompts

By default, your phone provides audio prompts such as "Please say a command". You can turn these prompts on or off.

## To turn voice dial prompts On or Off:

## Voice Memo

You can use your phone to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or other items.

## Recording Voice Memos

## To record a voice memo:

1. Press for Menu, followed by 1 - for Voice Kit.
2. Press Enat for Voice Memo.
3. Press for Record. (The phone prompts you to start recording after the beep.)
4. Wait for the beep and then start speaking. (As it is recording, the phone displays a countdown timer that shows how many seconds are left for recording.)

- Press the left softkey $\cdots$ to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left softkey … again to Resume recording.)

5. To finish recording, press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Finish.

## To record a conversation during a phone call:

1. During a call, press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options.
2. Press Eruv for Voice Memo. (As it is recording, the phone displays a countdown timer that shows how many seconds are left for recording.)

- Press the left softkey $\cdots$ to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left softkey ... again to Resume recording.)

3. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Finish to end the recording prior to the countdown completion

Note: A total of 10 minutes in 10 separate memos can be recorded and saved. Individual memos can record up to 60 seconds of audio.

## Reviewing and Erasing Memos

## To play the voice memos you have recorded:

1. Press for Menu, followed by for Voice Kit.
2. Press Enme for Voice Memo.
3. Press Enect for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
4. Select a memo and press "\%

- or -

Press the number corresponding to the memo you want to review. (The phone replays the memo.)

- Press the left softkey … to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left softkey ... again to Resume playing.)


## To erase an individual memo:

1. Press for Menu, followed by for Voice Kit.
2. Press Enme for Voice Memo.
3. Press Enoct for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
4. Select the memo to erase.
5. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options followed by for Erase.
6. Press the navigation key up to select Yes and press "ow.

## To erase all voice memos:

1. Press for Menu, followed by 1 - for Voice Kit.
2. Press Enme for Voice Memo.
3. Press enect for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
4. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options followed by enot for Erase AII.
5. Press the navigation key up to select Yes and press

## Messaging

Now you can exchange text and multimedia messages right from your phone and stay connected without saying a word. Within the Messaging menu you can also view the number of voicemail messages you have waiting for you. For more information on using your phone's voicemail feature, see 'Voicemail" on page 42. The following folders are available in the Messaging menu:

- (1) Send Message: Allows you to send text messages.
- (2) Text Message: Allows you to create and send new text messages, as well as check your Text Message Inbox.
- (3) Picture Mail: Allows you to create and send new picture messages, as well as check your Picture Mail Inbox.
- (5) Voicemail: Allows you to view or listen to any voice messages saved in the phone.
- (6) Settings: Allows you to configure the messaging options.


## Text Messaging

## Using Text Messaging

With Text Messaging, you can use a person's wireless phone number to send instant text messages from your phone to their messaging-ready phone - and they can send messages to you. When you receive a new message, you'll automatically be notified with a one-way text message.
In addition, messaging includes a variety of pre-set messages, such as "Where are you?" that make composing messages fast and easy.

## To send a text message:

## 1. Press for Menu. <br> 2. Press ᄅnex for Messaging. <br> 3. Press 1 for Send Message. <br> 4. Press $\mathbf{1}$ - for Text Message.

5. Enter the phone number or email address of the person(s) to whom you're sending a message.
[^3]- To send a text message to a Contact, press the navigation key up to highlight Go to Contacts and press appears. Highlight the desired Contact and press "ow to check/ uncheck the entry. You can check multiple Contacts (up to a maximum of 10). When you are finished, press the left softkey for Done.
- To select from a list of recently viewed contacts, press the right
 softkey ... for Recent List. A list of your recently viewed Contacts appears. Highlight the desired Contact and press "ok to check/ uncheck the entry. You can check multiple Contacts (up to a maximum of 10). When you are finished, press the left softkey for Done.

6. Press the left softkey $\cdots$ for Next.
7. Enter your message using the keypad. If you wish to change your text message options, press the right soffkey .... to select one of the following Options:

- T9(English): Switches your Text entry mode to T9 Text Input.
- Alpha: Switches your Text entry mode to Alpha.
- Symbol: Switches your Text entry mode to Symbol.
- Number: Switches your Text entry mode to Number.
- Preset Msg: Allows you to add a preset message to your text message.
- Recent Msg: Allows you to use a recent message for your text message.
- Emoticons: Adds an emoticon image to your text message.
- Text Options: To customize your character input mode (see 'Text Entry" on page 81).

8. Press the left softkey
9. Press the left softkey $\cdots$ to Send. If you wish to change your text message options, press the right softkey $\cdot .$. for Options and select one of the following:

- Edit: Allows you to re-enter the message recipients and the message.
- Priority: Allows you to set the priority level between Normal and Urgent.
- Call Back \#: Allows you to select None to omit the call back \#, to select your phone \#, or to select Other to enter a different call back \#.
- Save to Drafts: Stores a copy of the text message in your Drafts folder.


## To read and reply to a Text Message:

When you receive a text message, you will see "New Message" on your display screen.

## To reply to the text message:

1. While the message is open, select the left softkey $\cdots$ for Reply.
2. Compose your reply message. When you are finished, press
3. Press the left softkey $\cdots$ to Send.

Note: The last preset message used automatically moves to the top of the list when you send a new message.

## Picture Mail

Your phone gives you the ability to take pictures, view them using the phone's display, and instantly send them to your friends and family. In addition to sending your pictures to friends and family, you can also send them to a Picture Messages Web site for storage. The camera can take and store pictures and the image quality is similar to what you see on your computer screen.

## Sending Picture Mail from your Phone

## To send a Picture Mail message from your phone:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press Enet for Messaging.
3. Press 1 - for Send Message.
4. Press Enet for Picture Mail.
5. Using the navigation key select either In Camera to send a picture already stored in your phone or New Picture to take a new picture prior to sending your message.

- For more information on taking a picture, see "Taking Pictures" on page 58.
- If you selected In Camera, use the navigation key to highlight a picture and press ${ }^{\circ}$. A checkmark appears beside the picture. You can select up to 10 pictures.

6. Once you have finished selecting all the pictures you wish to send press the left softkey … for Next.
7. Using the navigation key select the destination you wish to send the picture(s) to and press
8. Enter your destination and press the left softkey ... for OK. You can send each message to up to 10 destinations.
9. When you have finished entering all the desired destinations, press the left softkey … for Next.

- If you wish to add text to your picture message, highlight Subj and Text and press the right softkey ... for Add. Enter your text and press the left softkey ... for Save.
- If you wish to add an audio clip, highlight Audio and press the right softkey ... for Record. From the Add Voice Memo screen, press the left softkey … for Record to record your message. When finished, press the left softkey … for Done.

10. Press the left softkey $\ldots$ for Send.

## Voicemail

## Setting Up Your Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you will want to set up your Voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

## To set up your voicemail:

1. Press and hold 1 -
2. Follow the system prompts to create your passcode.

Note: You must request this feature from your service provider for it to work
correctly.

Note: The voicemail setup process may vary in certain Affiliate areas.

## Voicemail Notification

There are several ways your phone alerts you of a new message:

- By displaying a message on the screen.
- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By displaying $\square$ at the top of the screen.


## New Voicemail Message Alerts

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to call your voicemail.

## To call your voicemail:

- Press and hold 1 -

Important: When you are roaming off your home network, you may not receive notification of new voicemail messages. It is recommended that you periodically check your voicemail by dialing $1+$ area code + your phone number. When your voicemail answers, enter your passcode and press \#sw. You will be charged roaming rates when accessing voicemail while roaming off your home network.

> Note: Your phone service accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, you are only notified of new messages when your phone is turned on and you are in a Service Area.

## Retrieving Your Voicemail Messages

You can review your messages directly from your phone or from any other touchtone phone. To dial from your phone, you can either speed dial your voicemail or use the menu keys.

## To Use One-Touch Message Access:

- Press and hold 1 - Follow the system prompts.


## To Use the Menus:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press Enect for Messaging.
3. Press 4 em for Voicemail.
4. Press 1■ to call the voicemail server.

Note: You may be charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voicemail from your phone.

## Viewing the Message Details

You can check to see how many voicemail messages you have, and the time of the last voicemail message.

## To view voicemail message details:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press Enex for Messaging.
3. Press 4 em for Voicemail.
4. Press Enme for Details.

## Clearing the Message Envelope

## To clear the message envelope from the display screen:

## Settings

There are several options associated with messaging. The Message Setup menu allows you to customize the options to fit your preferences. The message options are divided into the following categories:

- Notification: Allows you to configure whether new messages will appear with a pop-up message or with an icon.
- Sending Options: Allows you to configure the default Priority level and Call Back number for messages.
- Preset Messages: Allows you to edit or change the default pre-written messages.
- Edit Signature: If the option is $\mathbf{O n}$, your signature will be appended to each message you send.
- Message Alerts: Allows you to configure the Alert Volume level, Alert Type, and Reminder settings for Message Alerts.
- Save In Outbox: If Yes is selected, a copy of the message is automatically saved in the Outbox after being sent.
- Auto Erase: If Yes is selected, old messages are automatically deleted from the mail boxes when they become full. This allows the new messages to be added to a full mail box without having to manually delete old messages to free up space first.
- Alert Setup: If Yes is selected, configures the phone to auto-connect web alerts when possible.
- Voice Mail \#: Allows you to configure the voicemail number.


## To access the Settings menu:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press Enet for Messaging.
3. Press 5 mm for Settings.

## Notifications

The Notifications options allow you to select whether a message in a popup window appears to alert you that new messages are waiting.

## To turn On the Display Popup option:

1. In the Settings menu, press 1』 for Notification.
2. Select Message and Icon or Icon Only using the navigation key and press "w to select.

## Sending Options

The Sending Options allow you to configure the Priority and Call Back number for outgoing messages. Once configured, these options are the default settings for any new messages that are created.

## Priority

There are two priority levels associated with text messaging. They are:

- Normal: This option sends the message as normal with regular delivery.
- Urgent: This option sends the message at the highest level and alerts the recipient that it is urgent.
This setting allows you to select the default priority level when creating new messages.


## To select the priority level:

1. In the Settings menu, press Emect for Sending Options.
2. Press 1 - for Priority.
3. Select Normal or Urgent using the navigation key and press to select.

## Call Back Number

This option allows you to enter a call back number that is automatically attached to your outgoing messages.

## To access the call back number option:

1. In the Settings menu, press ${ }^{\text {nucc }}$ for Sending Options.
2. Press ᄅnoct for Call Back \#.
3. Use the navigation key to highlight either None, your phone \#, or Other for a custom \# and press
4. For the custom call back \#, press and hold BACK to erase the existing number. Enter the number using the keypad and press to save.

## Preset Messages

Preset messages are used to enter common responses to questions often received in text messages. A preset message can be selected and automatically entered into the message. Preset messages can also be changed to whatever you want to use by editing the 20 pre-set entries already stored in your phone.

## To edit a preset message:

1. In the Settings menu, press $\mathrm{Z}^{\text {ouf }}$ for Preset Messages.
2. Press the navigation key up or down to highlight the desired message or available entry and press or the left softhey … for Edit to edit the message.
3. Press and hold BACK to erase the message. Enter your new message and press to save. You can also edit the existing message using the keypad.

Note: When you send a message using Preset Messages, the last message selected automatically displays as the first choice when sending a new message. This also applies when you edit or add to a message.

## Edit Signature

The Edit Signature menu allows you to create a signature of up to 15 characters that is automatically appended to all your text messages.

## To edit your signature, or to turn signatures on or off:

1. In the Settings menu, press 4 em for Edit Signature.
2. Press the navigation key up or down to highlight $\mathbf{O n}$ or $\mathbf{O f f}$ and press "
3. If signatures are on, your current signature is displayed. Press and hold BACK to erase the signature. Enter your new signature and press the left softkey $\cdots$ for Save. You can also edit the existing signature using the keypad.

## Message Alerts

The Message Alerts menu allows you to configure the volume and message reminder default settings for voicemail, text messages, and picture mail.

## Alert Volume

This option allows you to select the volume level for message alerts for voicemail, text messaging, and picture mail. The level can be set to Ringer off, Vibrate, 1Beep, or a volume level between 1-8.
To set the volume:

1. In the Settings menu, press 5 mm for Message Alerts.
2. Press 1 ■ for Alert Volume.
3. Select the type of message that this alert is for: Voicemail, ᄅnex Text Message or Boer $^{\text {our }}$ Picture Mail.
4. Press the navigation key up or down to move between ringer options. For Separate Vol., press the navigation key left or right to select the desired volume level and press the left softkey $\ldots$ for Done.

Note: Press the navigation key down to highlight Always Vibrate and press to select it.

## Alert Type

This option allows you to select the ringer type for voicemail, text messaging, picture mail, and web alerts. Any ringer saved in the phone can be used as the default ringer. Ringers that are downloaded can also be assigned.

## To set the ringer type:

1. In the Settings menu, press 5 mm for Message Alerts.
2. Press Enet for Alert Type.
3. Press:

- 1 - for Voicemail
- Ennct for Text Message
- $\mathrm{B}^{\text {oex }}$ for Picture Mail
- 4 ew for Web Alert

4. Press the navigation key left or right to select Ring Tones, Melodies, or Downloads.
5. Press the navigation key down to preview the first ringer. Press left or right to preview the other ringers associated with the ringer group selected. When finished, press to save the desired ringer.

## Reminder

This option allows you to configure how often the reminder for new messages is sounded or displayed on the phone.
The available options are:

- Off: No reminder is sounded or heard on the phone.
- Once: A reminder is sounded or displayed once to alert you of new messages.
- Every 2 min : A reminder is sounded or displayed every two minutes until the new message is read.


## To set the message reminder option:

1. In the Settings menu, press $\mathbf{5 m m}^{\mathrm{mm}}$ for Message Alerts.
2. Press $\mathrm{B}^{\mathrm{ow}}$ for Reminder.
3. Press the navigation key up or down to select the desired duration and press "ow to select.

## Save in Outbox

This option allows you to save a copy of the outgoing text message in the outbox.

## To turn this option On or Off:

1. In the Settings menu, press $\sigma^{m m o d}$ for Save In Outbox.
2. Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No and press to select.

## Auto Erase

This option allows you to automatically delete old messages when the Inbox becomes full. This prevents new messages from being rejected due to the Inbox being full.

## To turn this option On or Off:

1. In the Settings menu, press $7_{\text {Tom }}$ for Auto Erase.
2. Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No and press to select.

## Alert Setup

This option allows the phone to automatically connect to the web where possible when a web alert arrives.

## To turn this option On or Off:

1. In the Settings menu, press Buv for Alert Setup.
2. Press the navigation key up or down to select $\mathbf{O n}$ or $\mathbf{O f f}$ and press to select.

## Voice Mail Number

This option allows you to enter a return voice mail number that is automatically attached to your outgoing messages.

## To access the voice mail number option:

1. In the Settings menu, press $\boldsymbol{\square}^{n \times \pi=0}$ for Voice Mail \#.
2. Enter the number using the keypad and press to save.

## Tools

## Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range communications technology that allows you to connect wirelessly to a number of Bluetooth devices, such as headsets, hands-free car kits, and Bluetooth-enabled handhelds, PCs, printers, and wireless phones. For more information, see "Bluetooth" on page 103.

## Today and Scheduler

Your Scheduler helps organize your time and reminds you of important events. You can schedule events for either the current day or a specific calendar date.

## Adding an Event to the Scheduler

## To add an event to today's schedule:

1. Press for Menu.

2. Press Enoc for Today.

- If you have no events currently scheduled for today, the New Event menu is automatically displayed.
- If you have one or more events scheduled for today, they are displayed. Press the right softkey ... for Options, followed by 1 for Add New.

World time displays the current time in twenty-four different time zones around the world together with one or more major cities, states, regions, or countries in a time zone.

4. Press the navigation key left, right, up, or down to display the different time zones.
5. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options and press $\mathbf{1}$ - for DST Setting to turn Daylight Savings Time (DST) On or Off.

Note: Your handset does not automatically turn DST on or off based on the calendar date.

## Updating Your Phone

You can automatically download and update the software on your phone. Only the internal software is updated and other information on the phone, such as Contacts, is not deleted.

## Taking Pictures

Taking pictures with your phone's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a button. You can activate camera mode and take pictures whether the phone is open or closed.

## To take a picture with the phone open:

1. Press \%or for Menu.
2. Press 4 ew for Pictures.
3. Press 1 for Camera.

Shortcut: To activate camera mode, you can also press and hold the the side camera button $\qquad$ (see illustration on page 2).
4. Using the phone's main LCD as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject.
5. Press either the left softkey $\cdots$ for Capture, or the side camera button ( ) until the shutter sounds. (Make sure the camera is steady.)
6. After the picture is taken, press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Next.
7. The picture is saved in your My Pictures folder. Choose one of the following options:

- (1) Send Msg: To send your picture to someone using Picture Mail. For more information, see "Picture Mail" on page 40.
- (2) Upload: To upload the picture to your online folder, see "Using an Online Album" on page 63.
- (3) Assign: To assign the picture to Picture ID, Screen Saver, or Incoming Call, see "Display" on page 72.
- (4) Erase: To erase this picture.
- (5) Camera Mode: To take another picture.
- (6) Review Pictures: To review the images stored in your camera.

8. To exit camera mode, press

## Camera Options

There are several settings associated with the full-color digital camera. These settings allow you to customize how the camera operates when taking pictures.

## To set a camera option:

1. Start the camera. For more information, see "Taking Pictures" on page 58.
2. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for $\mathbf{O p t i o n s .}$
3. Press the number key corresponding to the desired option.

- (1) Self Timer: Allows you to configure a timer for Off, $\mathbf{5}$ Sec. or 10 Sec.
- (2) Fun Tools: Allows you to select:

Fun Frames: Allows you to select a frame to be placed around the image before the picture is taken. Press the navigation key left or right to select the desired frame. Press to select it and return to the camera mode.
Color Tones: Allows you to select between several different color tones including Auto, Negative, Sepia, Emboss, Aqua,
Monochrome (black \& white), and Sketch by pressing the navigation key left or right. When you find the desired tone, press

- (3) Controls: Allows you to set the Brightness, White Balance, and Night Shot for your pictures.
Brightness: Allows you to set the brightness level. Press the navigation key left or right to increase or decrease the desired brightness.
White Balance: Allows you to set up the white balance of the camera automatically or manually using the different preset modes. The modes available are:
- Auto: Automatically adjusts the lighting.
- Sunny: Decreases the light sensitivity for taking pictures in full or mostly sunny conditions.
- Cloudy: Increases light sensitivity for taking pictures under cloudy conditions.
- Tungsten: Adjusts the white balance to match the inside lighting conditions displayed using common household light bulbs.
- Fluorescent: Adjusts the white balance to match the inside lighting conditions displayed using common fluorescent lighting.
- Manual: Allows you to adjust the white balance settings manually.
Night Shot: Adjusts the camera to take images in dark lighting conditions.
- (4) Settings: Allows you to change the following camera settings:

Resolution: Your full-color digital camera can take pictures in three different modes. Each of the modes allow you to increase the zoom multiple levels, depending on the picture quality setting. This allows you to get a closer view of the subject or scenery being photographed. The available sizes are:

- High (640*480): This is the highest resolution setting available for this camera, thus allowing you the most image detail. Images taken at the high setting require more memory to save than the other two modes.
- Med (320*240): The medium setting allows you to take good quality images without using too much memory.
Low (224*168): The low setting allows you to take average quality images. You can save the most images in memory using this setting.

Tip: While in Capture mode, the zoom feature is available using the navigation key.

Quality: The quality allows you to select between Fine, Normal, and Economy. These settings reflect the image quality settings for the pictures.
Shutter Sound: The shutter sound allows you to select between 3 different shutter sounds or to turn it off. The shutter sound is heard when you take a picture.

## View Mode: Changes the viewing mode between Full Screen and Wide Screen.

- (5) Review Pictures: Allows you to review pictures currently stored in your camera's memory.


## Setting the Self-timer

To activate the Self-timer and get yourself in on the picture:

1. With the phone open and in Camera mode, press the right softkey ... for Options.
2. Press 1 for Self Timer.
3. Using the navigation key, highlight the length of delay you want the timer to use ( $\mathbf{5} \mathbf{~ s e c}$ or $\mathbf{1 0} \mathbf{~ s e c}$ ) and press "
4. Press the left softkey $\cdots$ to Start the timer. (A timer is displayed in the upper right portion of the main LCD during the Self Timer countdown and the phone starts beeping.)
5. Get ready for the picture. When the timer is down to 5 seconds, beep sounds are made.

## To cancel the Self Timer after it has started:

- Press the right softkey $\cdots$ to Cancel.

Note: While the Self timer is active, all keys are disabled except the right softkey and BACK.

## Picture Messaging

Once you've taken a picture, it is automatically saved in the camera. You can share the picture instantly with family and friends. With Picture Messaging, a picture can be sent to up to ten people at a time using their email addresses or phone numbers (if their phones are equipped to receive picture messages). For more details, see "Picture Mail" on page 40.

## Storing Pictures

Your phone can store pictures in three ways:

- In Camera: A folder that keeps photos taken through the camera.
- Saved to Phone: A folder that keeps photos downloaded or received from other users.
- Online Albums: An online folder provided by your service provider. Images located in In Camera and Saved to Phone can be assigned to address book entries, uploaded to online albums, sent to other users, or saved for future use.

Note: When pictures are assigned as your screen saver, they are modified to fit the screen.

When you access either location, the following options are available when you press the right softkey

- Upload: Allows you to upload the image to an online album on the web. (Only available in In Camera.)
- Assign: Allows you to assign an image to an address book entry, Screen Saver, or Incoming Call.
- Save to Phone: Allows you to save the image in the phone.
- Edit Caption: Allows you to edit the default name given to the image when the picture was taken.
- Erase: Allows you to erase a single or all of the stored images.
- Picture Info: Displays detailed information about the image.
- Camera Mode: Launches the Camera function.
- Expand/Thumbnail: Allows you to change the aspect of the image between full screen and thumbnail size.
- Send Msg: Allows you to send the image as a Picture message.


## In Camera

Your phone displays a picture immediately after it is taken and stores the image in the In Camera folder. Pictures stored in your phone can be viewed at any time without connecting to the web.

## To access the images:

## 1. Press <br> 2. Press 4 ew for Pictures. <br> 3. Press Enoct for My Pictures.

4. Using the navigation key, select In Camera and press *ow.

## Saved to Phone

When pictures are downloaded from the web or sent from another user, they are stored in the Saved to Phone folder. Web access is not required to view these images.

## Online Albums

Online Albums are remote storage spaces that can be accessed using your phone. The locations can be used to save pictures from your phone.

## Using an Online Album

The first time you use any of the management options involving the Picture Messaging Web site you will need to establish a Picture Messaging password through your phone. This password will also allow you to log in to the Picture Messaging Web site. Please contact your service provider for the web site details to access and manage your uploaded pictures and albums.

## To upload pictures to an Online Album:

## 1. Press for Menu. <br> 2. Press 4 em for Pictures. <br> 3. Press $\mathrm{B}^{\mathrm{obs}}$ for Online Albums.

4. Using the navigation key, select Upload Picture and press

5. Highlight the desired image using the navigation key and press "ow to select the image. A checkmark appears in the top left corner of the image.

5. Use the navigation key to view the account information.

## View Mode

The View Mode screen allows you to change the viewing mode for pictures between Full Screen and Wide Screen.

## To change View Mode

2. Press 4 ew for Pictures.
3. Press 4 em for Settings and Info.
4. Press Emex for View Mode.
5. Use the navigation key to select Full Screen or Wide Screen and press "

## Call History

## Viewing History

You'll find the Call History feature very helpful. It is a list of the last 150 phone numbers (or Contacts entries) for calls you missed, made, or accepted. Call History makes redialing a number fast and easy. It is continually updated as new numbers are added to the beginning of the list and the oldest entries are removed from the bottom of the list.
Each entry contains the phone number (if it is available) and Contacts entry name (if the phone number is in your Contacts). Duplicate calls (same number and type of call) may only appear once on the list.

## To view a Call History entry:

## 1. Press ${ }^{\circ}{ }^{0}$ for Menu. <br> 2. Press $\mathbf{5 m}$ for Call History. <br> 3. Press 1 - for Recent History.

4. Use the navigation key to select a Contact name to view their messages.

Tip: You can also access your list of recent calls from standby mode by pressing the tank key.

## Call History Options

For additional information on a particular call, highlight a Call History entry and press

Tip: You can also scroll between Call History entries by pressing the navigation key left or right.

Press the left softkey to Send Msg the phone number. Press the right softkey for Options to select one of the following options for the entry:

- Delete/Delete All: To erase either this number or all numbers from your Call History.
- Prepend: To add a prefix before dialing the phone number.
- Save Contact: To save the phone number in your Contacts. (If the number is already in Contacts, Contact Details is shown.)


## Making a Call From Call History

## To place a call from Call History:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press 5 mm for Call History.
3. Press 1 - for Recent History.
4. Highlight the entry you want to call and press to dial the number.

Tip: When in standby mode, you can also press the calls. Highlight the entry you want to call and press
key to show your recent to dial the number.

Note: You cannot make calls from Call History to entries identified as Unknown or Restricted.

## Saving a Phone Number From Call History

Your phone can store up to 500 numbers. Each contact can store up to a total of five phone numbers, and each Contact's name can contain up to 20 characters.

## To save a phone number from Call History:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\boldsymbol{5 m}$ for Call History.
3. Press 1 - for Recent History.
4. Highlight the entry you want to save and press
5. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options and select Save Contact. Follow the onscreen prompts to complete the entry. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 16.)
After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.
Note: You cannot save phone numbers already in your Contacts or from calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted.

## Prepending a Phone Number From Call History

If you need to make a call from Call History and you happen to be outside your local area code, you can add the appropriate prefix by prepending the number.

## To prepend a phone number from Call History:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{5 m}$ for Call History.
3. Press 1 - for Recent History.
4. Highlight the entry you want to prepend and press
5. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for $\mathbf{O p t i o n s}$, and select Prepend.
6. Use the keypad to enter the desired numbers.
7. Press trank or the left softkey $\cdots$ to Call.

## Erasing Call History

To erase an individual Call History entry, see "Call History Options" on page 66.

## To erase Call History:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press 5 mm for Call History.
3. Press 1 - for Recent History.
4. Press the right softkey $\cdots$ for Options and select Delete All.
5. Using the navigation key, highlight Yes, and press wow.

## Air Time

Air time allows you to check the time of the last call or the total air time since your phone was activated on the network. These times are not meant for billing purposes.

## To view the air time:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press [5m for Call History.
3. Press Emet for Air Time.
4. Press 1 - for Last Call or Enmi for Total Calls.

## Web

## The Wireless Web

Your phone comes equipped with Wireless Web access. You can view specially designed versions of popular sites including sports, weather, news, stock quotes etc. ... as well as accessing downloadable ringtones, screensavers, and games. When you launch the web, the phone will connect to the Internet and the service indicator icon will display. Any time the service indicator icon is visible on the display, you are connected to the Internet and will be invoiced accordingly.

Note: Rates and pricing vary according to your service plan. Please contact your service provider for additional information.

## Launching the Web

Note: The first time you use the Web, you will be prompted to go through a setup process that takes approximately three minutes.

## To launch a web connection:

## 1. Press for Menu. <br> 2. Press $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\text {wno }}$ for Web.

3. You are connected to the home page provided by your service provider. If you had a previous web connection, the home page is displayed by default when you launch the web. Though the browser is open, you are not currently in an active data session - that is, no data is being sent or received. As soon as you navigate to another page, the active session will launch.

## Web Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone's display lets you know the current status of your web connection through indicators which appear at the top of the screen. The following symbols are used:

When your web connection is active (data is being transferred). Incoming voice calls go directly to voicemail. Outgoing voice calls can be made but the web connection will terminate.
When your web connection is dormant (no data is being sent or received). Though not currently active, when dormant the phone can restart an active connection quickly and voice calls can be made and received.

## Navigating the Wireless Web

Navigating through menus and Web sites during a web session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

## Softkeys

When browsing the Web, the bottom line of your phone's display contains one or more softkeys. These keys are shortcut controls for navigating around the Web, and they correspond to the softkey buttons directly below the phone's display screen. Depending on which Web sites you visit, the labels on the softkeys may change to indicate their function.
To use softkeys, simply press the desired softkey button. If an additional pop-up menu appears when you press the softkey button, select the menu items using your keypad (if they're numbered) or by highlighting the option and pressing "ow.

## Scrolling

As with other parts of your phone's menu, you have to scroll up and down to see everything on some Web sites.

- Press the navigation key up and down to scroll line by line or press the volume buttons on the side of the phone to scroll one page at a time.


## Navigating Between Web Pages

Once you've learned how to use softkeys and scroll, you can start navigating Web sites.

- Select on-screen items by using the navigation key to highlight the desired item and pressing the desired softkey button (or pressing ${ }^{\circ}{ }^{\circ}$ ).
You'll find that the left softkey $\cdots$ is used primarily for selecting items. This softkey is often labeled $\mathbf{O K}$.
- If the items on a page are numbered, you can use your keypad (number keys) to select an item.
Links, which appear as underlined text, allow you to jump to different Web pages, select special functions, or even place phone calls.
- Select links by highlighting the link and selecting the appropriate softkey.

Tip: The tenth item in a numbered list can be selected by pressing
the key on your phone's keypad, even though the number 0 doesn't appear on the screen.

## 70 Web

- To go back one page, press BACK on your phone. (Note that BACK is also used like a BACKSPACE key to delete text.)


## Using the Menu to Navigate

By pressing the Menu softkey, you can navigate between web pages.

## Press the Menu softkey and select one of the following options:

1. Home: To return to the Web Home Page.
2. Forward: One web page (if you have not returned back from a previous web page, this option is red).
3. Mark this page: To create a Bookmark.
4. My Bookmarks: To see your list of Bookmarks.
5. Search: To type in a keyword and search for it on the web.
6. Send Page to: To send a web address in an SMS message.
7. Go to Web Address: To directly jump to a specific web page.
8. History: To see a list of web pages you have browsed in this session.
9. Page Info: To refresh the information on the current webpage.
10. Browser Options: To change your Wireless Web preferences.

Note: Scroll down the list to select Browser Options.

8. Press the left softkey for Done.

## Changing the Greeting

The text greeting can be up to 14 characters and is displayed on your phone's Main Screen in standby mode. You can choose to display a custom greeting or display your User Name on the phone's screen.

6. Using the navigation key, increase or decrease the contrast level setting and press "ow

## Changing the Phone's Menu Style

Your phone allows you to choose how the menu appears on your display screen.

## Changing the LCD Brightness and Contrast

You can change the brightness and contrast of the main and external LCDs, making the screens brighter or dimmer.

- If you selected any other option, press the left softkey .... for Done.

## Ringer Type

Ringer types help you identify incoming calls and messages. You can assign ringer types to individual Contacts entries, types of calls, Scheduler entries, and types of messages.

- Ring Tones: Include a variety of standard ringer types.
- Melodies: Include a variety of standard musical melodies.
- Downloads: Ringers include all of the ringtones you have previously downloaded. See "Downloading Ringers" on page 91.


## Selecting Ringer Types

Your phone provides a variety of ringer options that allow you to customize your ring and volume settings. These options allow you to identify incoming calls by the ring.

## To select a ringer type:

3. Press Enex for Sounds.
4. Press 1 - for Ringer Type.
 4 em for Roaming, or [5m for Vibration

- For Voice Calls, press 1 - for With Caller ID or Enct for No Caller ID.
- For Messages, press 1 ® for Voicemail, Enet for Text Message, $3^{\text {oner }}$ for Picture Mail, or 4 ew for Web Alert.
- For Roaming, press Normal or Distinctive and press to save and exit.

6. Press the navigation key left or right to select a Ring Tones, Melodies, or Downloads ringer type.
7. Press the navigation key down and then left or right to select the desired ringer.
8. Press to save and exit.

## Volume

You can set different volumes for the ringer, speakerphone, text messages, picture mail, voicemail, alarms, and applications.

## To adjust the ringer or key tone volume:

3. Press Enat for Sounds.
4. Press Emoc for Volume.
 Speakerphone, or 5 mm for Advanced.

- Ringer: Press the navigation key left or right until the desired volume level is selected. Press to enable or disable Always Vibrate. Press the left softkey ... for Done to exit.
- Speakerphone: Press the navigation key left or right until the desired volume level is selected. Press to save and exit.
- For the other options, select Use Ringer Vol. to use the settings assigned to ringer. Select Separate Vol. to use a custom volume setting. Press the left softkey … for Done to exit.
- Select Advanced to set the volume for 1 - for Alarms, 巴 ${ }^{\operatorname{manc}}$ for Application, $\mathrm{B}^{\text {oes }}$ for Text Message, 4 em for Picture Mail, or 5 mm for Voice Mail.

Tip: You can adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (or the earpiece volume during a call) using the volume key on the side of your phone.

## Alerts

Your phone can alert you with an audible tone when you change service areas, once a minute during a voice call, or when a call has been connected.
The different actions available are:

- Minute Beep: An alert tone is sounded every minute that you are connected.
- Out of Service: An alert tone is sounded when you come in or out of your coverage area.
- Connect: An alert tone is sounded when you are initially connected.
- Signal Fade/Call Drop: An alert tone is sounded when the signal fades and the connection is lost. An alert tone is also sounded when your phone partially loses signal due to network conditions.
- Roam Ringer: An alert tone is sounded when you are connected to a network other than your home network.
- Power On/Off: An alert tone is sounded when your phone is powered $\mathbf{O n}$ or Off.


## To enable or disable alert sounds:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{7 m o x s ~}^{\text {for Settings. }}$
3. Press Enat for Sounds.
4. Press $\mathrm{B}^{\mathrm{oder}}$ for Alerts.
5. Press:

- 1 - for Minute Beep
- Enuc for Out of Service
- $\mathrm{B}^{\text {our }}$ for Connect
- 4 ent for Signal Fade/Call Drop
- 5 mm for Roam Ringer

6. Select $\mathbf{O n}$ or $\mathbf{O f f}$ using the navigation key and press to save and exit.

## Key Tones

Your phone offers a number of options for selecting the audible tones accompanying a key press.

The Text Entry menu allows you to customize how T9 text entry mode functions on your handset. For more information, see "Entering Characters Using T9 Text Input" on page 19.

## To change your Text Entry options:

3. Press $\boldsymbol{\Xi}^{\text {oer }}$ for Text Entry.
4. Using the navigation key, select one of the following options and press "w:

- Auto Capital: When activated, capitalizes the first word of a sentence. Highlight On or Off and press \%ow.
- Auto-Space: When activated, adds a space after you select a word in T9 Mode. Highlight On or Off and press wow.
- Dual Language: When activated and you are in T9 Mode, displays choices from both the English and French dictionaries. Highlight None or French and press "m".
- My Words: When activated, adds the word to the personal dictionary.
- Used Word Dic.: When activated, adds the words used to the phone's dictionary. Highlight Yes or No and press
- Display Candidate: When activated and you are in T9 Mode, displays possible word choices on the screen. Highlight Display On or Display Off and press
- Prediction Start: Sets the number of letters required to activate the Display Candidate feature. Highlight the numbers of letters you wish to start Display Candidate and press
- Help: Provides additional information on using T9 text entry mode. Scroll up or down using the navigation key. When you are finished, press the left softkey ... for OK.


## Call Setup

Call Setup options allow you to set up the following options:

- Abbrev. Dial: Allows you to program a five or six digit prefix for commonly used phone numbers. Once enabled, the phone will prepend the prefix to the 5 or 6 digit number that you have dialed.
- ContactS Match: Allows you to turn On or Off the contact matching feature. When On, you can dial the last few digits and press rum. A list of Contacts entries appears whose last few digits match the sequence you dialed.
- Restriction: Allows you to restrict outgoing calls.
- Call Answer: Allows you to set up how you answer incoming calls.
- Auto Answer: Allows you to answer incoming calls automatically with the optional hands-free car kit.


## Abbrev. Dial

Abbreviated dialing allows you to program a five or six digit prefix for commonly used phone numbers. When abbreviated dialing is on, you can enter the last four or five digits and the handset will prepend the five or six digit prefix to the
sequence you have entered to complete the dialing number.

## To set up abbreviated dialing:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{7 e r e r g}^{\text {for Settings. }}$
3. Press 4 em for Call Setup.
4. Press for Abbrev. Dial.
5. Select On or Off and press wo.
6. If you select On, input the five or six digit prefix (for example, area code and prefix) and press "ow".

## Making an Abbreviated Dial Call

1. Enter the last four or five digits of the prefix phone number. Abbrev. Dial is displayed in the lower left corner with the prefix digits displayed.
2. Press to make the call.

## Contacts Match

With the Contacts Match feature, your phone displays the Contact's name and phone number if the incoming call or outgoing call is in your Contacts list.

## To set up contacts match:

1. Press \%or Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{7 m o m ~}^{\text {for }}$ Settings.
3. Press 4 ew for Call Setup.
4. Press Enot for Contacts Match.
5. Select On or Off and press \%ow.

## Making a call using Contacts Match:

1. Dial the last few digits of the desired number and press A list of Contact entries appear whose last few digits match the sequence you dialed.
2. Use the up or down navigation key to select the Contact you want to call and press mux.

Note: If there is more than one Contact entry that matches the last four or five digits, a list is displayed that allows you to select the desired number to call.

## Restriction

Allows you to restrict outgoing call options by selecting one of the following options:

- Allow all: To allow outgoing calls to be made (no restrictions).
- Contacts Only: To allow only outgoing calls to those saved in the contacts.
- Special\# Only: To allow only outgoing calls to the numbers set up in the special numbers list.


## To access call restriction:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\boldsymbol{7}_{\text {moes }}$ for Settings.
3. Press 4 em for Call Setup.
4. Press $\boldsymbol{B}^{\text {oof }}$ for Restriction.
5. Press 1 for Outgoing Call.
6. Select Allow all, Contacts only, or Special\# only and press wo.

## Call Answer

To set the actions required to answer an incoming call:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathbf{7 m o r e s g}^{\text {for Settings. }}$
3. Press 4 em for Call Setup.
4. Press 4 em for Call Answer and select one of the following:
$\bullet$ Any key • Talk key • Flip open
5. Press ow to save and exit.

## Auto Answer

## To answer calls when your phone is connected to an optional hands-free car kit or headset:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\boldsymbol{Z}_{\text {moxs }}$ for Settings.
3. Press 4 ewn for Call Setup.
4. Press 5 m for Auto Answer.
5. Press the navigation key up or down to select Yes or No.
6. Press to save and exit.

## Launch Pad

You have the option of assigning the navigation key to an often-used function. The center of the navigation key cannot be changed. Pressing the navigation key in standby mode will launch the assigned feature.

## Airplane Mode

Airplane Mode allows you to use many of your phone's features, such as Games, Notepad, Voice Memos, etc., when you are in an airplane or any other area where making or receiving calls or data is prohibited. When your phone is in Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online information. All incoming calls will be sent directly to your voicemail box.

## To set your phone to Airplane Mode:

## Location

Your phone is equipped with a Location feature for use with location-based services that may be available in the future.
The Location feature allows the network to detect your position. Turning Location off will hide your location from everyone except 911.

## Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range communications technology that allows you to connect wirelessly to a number of Bluetooth devices, such as headsets, hands-free car kits, Bluetooth-enabled handhelds, PCs, and wireless phones. The Bluetooth communication range is usually up to approximately 10 meters ( 30 feet).

Note: There are many Bluetooth devices in the market whose compatibility with the SPH-m320 cannot be guaranteed.

## Enable

By default, your device's Bluetooth functionality is turned off. Turning Bluetooth on makes your device "discoverable" by other in-range Bluetooth devices.

## To turn Bluetooth on or off:

1. Press for Menu.
2. Press $\mathrm{B}^{\text {ouf }}$ for Tools.
3. Press 1 - for Bluetooth.
4. Press Enmi for Enable.
5. Select On or Off and press \%

## Visibility

The Visibility setting allows you to manage your availability to other Bluetooth devices.

Your phone's Bluetooth name will appear to other in-range Bluetooth devices, depending on your Visibility settings.

3. Press 1® for Bluetooth.
4. Press 4 em for Device Name.
5. Press and hold BACK to clear the current name.

The Bluetooth pairing process allows you to establish trusted connections between your phone and another Bluetooth device. When devices are paired, a passkey is shared between devices, allowing for fast, secure connections while bypassing the discovery and authentication process.

## To pair your phone with another Bluetooth device:

3. Press 1 - for Trusted Devices.

## Getting the Most Out of Your Reception

## Keeping Tabs on Signal Strength

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal. If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

## Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key. Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

## Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

## Knowing Radio Frequency Safety

The design of your phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below. In 1991-92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120 scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies, and industries developed this updated standard after reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted a hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

## Maintaining Your Phone’s Peak Performance

There are several simple guidelines for operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- Hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended, and over your shoulder.
- Try not to hold, bend, or twist the phone's antenna.
- Don't use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it's inoperable, return it to a dealer store or call Customer Support for service.

Note: For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

## Maintaining Safe Use of and Access to Your Phone

Failure to follow the instructions outlined may lead to serious personal injury and possible property damage.

## Using Your Phone While Driving

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions.
Remember that safety always comes first.

## When using your phone in the car:

- Get to know your phone and its features, such as speed dial and re-dial.
- When available, use a hands-free device.
- Position your phone within easy reach.
- Let the person you are speaking to know you are driving. If necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.
- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic. If possible, place calls when stationary or before pulling into traffic.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may divert your attention from the road.
- Dial 911 to report serious emergencies. It's free from your wireless phone.
- Use your phone to help others in emergencies.
> - Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless number when necessary.


## Following Safety Guidelines

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

## Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.
RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems and/or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.
Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

Note: Always turn off the phone in health care facilities and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

## Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying

Turn off your phone before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

## Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn off your phone when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating that two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.

## Turn off your phone when you are in an area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it is rare, your phone or its accessories could generate sparks. Sparks could cause an explosion or a fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked.

## These areas include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

Note: Never transport or store flammable gas, liquid, or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or its accessories.

## Restricting Children's Access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone, dial 911 by mistake, or make calls that increase your phone bill.

## Caring for the Battery

## Protecting Your Battery

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Use only Samsung approved batteries and desktop chargers. These chargers are designed to maximize battery life. Using other batteries or chargers voids your warranty and may cause damage.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from $32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ to $\left.45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$.
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- The battery may need recharging if it has not been used for a long period of time.
- It's best to replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable performance. When used correctly, the battery can be recharged hundreds of times before it needs replacing.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:
- Less than one month: $-4^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $140^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(-20^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ to $\left.60^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$

## Disposal of Lithium Ion (Lilon) Batteries
